It's a bigger problem than you think

18% of households are food insecure in our community²



1 in 4 children live in food insecure households³



52% of people who are food insecure have wages, salaries, or self-employment⁴



The cost of the Nutritious Food Basket⁸ for a family of four in 2023 is **\$1,349.27** per month.⁵ This is **14% higher** than in 2022.



There are higher rates of **physical and mental health conditions**⁷ among people who are food insecure – resulting in higher healthcare costs and even premature death.



Due to barriers including transportation, dietary needs, stigma, and shame, only **25%** of food insecure households use food access services such as food banks.¹⁰

A single person on Ontario Works receives just

\$733/month

to cover all expenses.

This amount has been frozen since 2018.

Food insecurity can affect anyone, anytime.

An income security crisis is the root cause.

Policy change is the answer.⁴

Income security is the effective response to food insecurity

Inadequate social assistance is keeping people in poverty

To afford just rent and food — let alone any other expense...

- A family of four reliant on Ontario Works would require at least an EXTRA \$300 per month⁵
- A single person reliant on Ontario Works would require at least an **EXTRA \$600 per month**⁵
- A single person on the Ontario Disability Support Program would require at least an EXTRA \$450 per month⁵



A family of four with one full-time worker earning minimum wage needs to use **74%** of their income to afford rent and food, leaving little for all other essential expenses.⁵



The living wage in Guelph-Wellington is **\$20.90/hr.**⁶ Ontario minimum wage is **\$16.55/hr**. For 2 working adults, earning minimum wage equals a **\$15,225/year shortfall**.⁹

Together, we can **DEMAND ACTION** to solve food insecurity.

- 1 Demand change sign the petition and advocate for increased social assistance rates.
- 2 Spread the word.
- 3 If you can, give time or money food access programs do not solve food insecurity, but they do provide essential relief.
